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Sea Glass Festival returns to Whaling Museum

he Whaling Museum and Education Center in Cold Spring Harbor has announced the return of its Sea Glass Festival, which features an array of new activities and enriched experiences for the 2024 season.

Set to take place on Sunday, July 21, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., this popular family-friendly event will celebrate the history, artistry, and allure of sea glass, now with an expanded presence on historic Main Street in Cold Spring Harbor. The event is the only one of its kind in the region and is the museum's largest community event which welcomes 1,000 attendees. It is supported in part with funds awarded through a grant from Suffolk County Economic Development and Planning.

"We are thrilled to bring Long Island's exclusive Sea Glass Festival to our community for the third year in a row," says Nomi Dayan, Executive Director at The Whaling Museum & Education Center. "Sea glass, along with the historic glass bottles in our collection, are unique portals into Long Island's stories. This year, we are excited to offer a number of expanded opportunities for both adults and children to appreciate and learn about the glass gems created by the ocean that surrounds us."

The festival will present an extended schedule featuring talks and lectures delivered by sea glass experts, historians, authors, and artists. These engaging sessions will be held in the museum's gallery and offsite at a neighboring event partner, Preservation Long Island, situated a 5-minute walk from The Whaling Museum.

"Our staff curated an exciting lineup of both returning and new presenters who will provide valuable insights and inspiration to our attendees. Our presenters' expertise and passion for sea glass and beachcombing will help educate the public on topics such as identifying sea glass, the history of local glass, and the creative applications of sea glass," said Dayan.

Speaker presentations at Preservation Long Island will take place at 11 a.m., noon, 1 p.m. and 2 p.m., with two presenters alternating: George Wm Fisher, author of multiple books on Long Island's bottles and medicine companies,



will present at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on "The Origins of Sea Glass."

Mary McCarthy, Beachcombing Educator and former Executive Director of The Beachcombing Center, will present next at noon and 2 p.m. on the "Difference between Fake and Genuine Sea Glass." Mary will also host her celebrated "Beachcombing Table" and offer sea glass identification for the public when she is not presenting.

Additional new activities that extend into historic Main Street in Cold Spring Harbor include: a scavenger hunt down Main Street; an exclusive visit to the Cold Spring Harbor Firehouse Museum; and the option to purchase a new sea glass-themed beverage from Sweetie Pies on Main.

In The Whaling Museum's gallery, festival attendees can attend new talks held every hour from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Speaker highlights include Amy Dries of "Tumbled by the Sea," a mobile museum that will be stationed in front of the festival tent, and author and historian Roxie Zwicker who will be discussing her new book, "New England Sea Glass: A Vibrant History." A full schedule of

talks and presentations is available at cshwhalingmuseum.org/seaglass.

Outdoors at the festival, attendees will have the chance to explore the mobile exhibit "Tumbled by the Sea" and take a self-guided tour of this travelling museum, shop with over a dozen artists and exhibitors under the tents including new artists and returning exhibitors, and view glass art torchwork demonstrations with Ro's Glass World.

Kids can partake in a sea glass scavenger hunt in the museum's gallery and enjoy complimentary crafts included with admission.

Live music by artist Rorie Kelly will add to the festive atmosphere, who performs fun, family-friendly crowd-pleaser music from the 1950s to today.


Returning again will be the Sea Glass of the Year contest, now featuring a new kids category.

Moreover, this year's festival introduces a new Sea Glass Writing Contest for Long Island youth in partnership with TBR News Media. Festival attendees can hear the entries of contest winners at the event.

Attendees wanting to explore their creative side can create a new shadow box craft in the museum workshop facilitated by museum educators. Tickets for this add-on craft can be purchased only at the event inside the museum's gallery.

When hunger strikes, festival attendees can enjoy offerings from the All-American Wontons food truck which will be on-site or visit any of the restaurants and cafes in Cold Spring Harbor, including Grasso's Restaurant, Sandbar, Harbor Mist, The Gourmet Whaler and the Cold Spring Harbor Deli.

Online tickets for the Sea Glass Festival are priced at a discount for advance purchase at \$15 for attendees and \$10 for museum members. 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

"From the trees in the forest to pulsating maple and spruces on my workbench, it is my way of giving process to unleashing the songs within the wood."



29th annual Stony Brook Film Festival presents the very best in new & independent films

tony Brook University's Staller Center for the Arts turns into a movie lover's mecca when new independent films screen at the Stony Brook Film Festival on evenings from Thursday, July 18 to Saturday, July 27. The popular festival, now in its 29th year, will become a hub for some of the best filmmakers working today, a meeting ground for favorite actors and rising stars, and a showcase of new masterpieces as it pairs memorable short films with an array of features you won't see anywhere else.

Presented by Island Federal, this year's lineup boasts 36 films from 19 countries and kicks off with the U.S. Premiere of *The Blond Boy from the Casbah*, Alexandre Arcady's semi-autobiographical dramedy about growing up in Algeria before emigrating to France as a teen. Festival Programmer Kent Marks describes the film as a "thought-provoking, unique journey through the past on the surprising path to self-discovery."

Closing the festival is the U.S. Premiere of the German epic *One Million Minutes*, an inspiring true story that follows an over-worked family trying to find balance in their lives, starring festival-favorite Karoline Herfurth.

While the films are never chosen with an overall theme in mind, oftentimes, a theme seems to emerge, and 2024 is no exception. "While our goal is to always program the best films we can find, this year, we gave ourselves the added goal of keeping an eye out for films that appeared to be on the lighter side so we could give our audience some extra laughs in their lives — something that we felt many people could use," says SBFF & Staller Center Director, Alan Inkles.

As festival-goers have come to expect, the 2024 schedule is still peppered with hard-hitting films, compelling dramas, and some very unique science-fiction.

This year's festival features nine films from Stony Brook Film Fest Alumni. "Filmmakers depend on these festivals to help them get their films distributed so as many people can see them as possible and to gauge how a live audience is responding to their work - Our alumni love returning because we have a large, engaged audience and ensure they get the best showing and hospitality possible," says Marks. "One of the most exciting parts for me is seeing these films up on the big screen and watching how the audience reacts," says Outreach Director Paul Newland, "after spending so much time previewing these films, it's truly exciting to see them have their big premiere in the festival, and our filmmakers love it too."

One of the key features of the Stony Brook Film Festival is that there is absolutely no other way to see these films.

"Netflix and streaming services are easy and comfortable, and we get that, but these films are not offered on streaming services. They're films looking to get picked up for distribution in order to stream or play in theaters - a lot of people don't get that - so this is the prime opportunity to be the first to know and to see some truly incredible films that you cannot see anywhere else," says Inkles. Honey Baked Beans

Recipe courtesy of National Honey Board

Yield: Serves 4 to 6 **Ingredients:**

- 4 slices bacon, diced
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 4 1/2 cups cooked navy beans (or 3 cans, 15 ounces each)
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup ketchup
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Directions:

Heat oven to 350° F. Saute bacon and onion until onion is tender; combine with remaining ingredients in shallow 2-quart, oven-safe baking dish. Cover with lid or aluminum foil and bake 30 minutes. Uncover and bake 45 minutes longer.



Patriotic Fruit Salad

Yield: Serves 4 Ingredients:

- 1 watermelon
- honeydew
- blueberries

Directions:

Slice 1/4 inch off bottom of



watermelon, lengthwise, to create stable base. Use pencil to draw zig-zag lines for basket opening. Using paring knife, make cuts through rind. Carefully remove top section, pull out large chunks of flesh and cut them into 3-by-3-inch squares. Trim 3/4-inch thick slices off squares to use for cutting out stars with 1 1/2-3-inch, star-shaped cookie cutters. Use ice cream scoop to remove flesh from inside basket and cut scoops into quarters for fruit salad. Place in bottom of basket. Add honeydew and blueberries; stir to combine.

Cut out white stripes from honeydew. Garnish top of fruit salad with watermelon stars, honeydew stripes and blueberries.

Bold Honey Barbecue Burger

Yield: Serves 4 **Ingredients:**

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped green onions
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 3-4 tablespoons steak seasoning
- 4 hamburger buns
- 1/2 stick melted butter
- 3/4 cup barbecue sauce
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 4 slices American cheese
- · 8 slices thick bacon, cooked until crispy
- 8 frozen onion rings
- 4 slices tomato
- · fresh lettuce

Directions:

Combine ground beef, green onions, garlic powder and cayenne pepper; form into four patties. Sprinkle both sides of each patty with steak seasoning. Cover and chill. (Patties can be made several hours in advance.) Brush buns with melted butter; set aside. In small bowl, mix barbecue sauce with honey; set aside. Heat grill to medium-high heat. Grill burgers to internal temperature of 160° F, about 4-6 minutes per side. Two minutes before burgers are finished, grill buns, butterside down, until golden brown. Place cheese slices on burgers to melt. Serve each burger on buttered bun topped with two slices bacon, two onion rings, honey barbecue sauce, lettuce and tomato.

Strawberries & Cream

Yield: Serves 6 Ingredients:

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- ½ cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups strawberries halved
- 4 fresh basil leaves

Directions:

Whisk together whipping

cream with sugar; add sour cream and vanilla extract. Whisk until well blended. Add strawberries to the cream mixture. Serve in glasses and garnish with a basil leaf.


Visitors will have a chance to meet Abraham Woodhull, Big Bill the Tory and Anna Smith Strong as well.
